Hurricane/Storm Shutters Task Force Recommendations for TwinEagles Adopted by the TEHOA Board of Directors July 27, 2020

- 1. Hurricane/storm shutters or shades, bolted on or mechanically lowered, are allowed to be closed, lowered, or bolted on windows and doors on the back and sides of single-family homes or condominiums in TwinEagles during the official hurricane season, which is June 1st through November 30th.
- 2. No hurricane/storm shutters or shades shall be closed, lowered, or bolted on the front of single-family homes or condominiums until the National Hurricane Center (NHC) issues its first Track Forecast Prediction Cone that predicts the possibility of a hurricane in the Naples area within five (5) days. The shutters or shades must be removed no later than fourteen (14) days after the NHC issues a Track Forecast Prediction Cone that no longer predicts the possibility of a hurricane in the Naples area. This includes all windows and doors including clear Lexan shutters in the front of detached homes and condominiums.
- 3. All hurricane/storm shutters or shades that are installed inside of a screened-in area or pool enclosure of a single-family home, and all hurricane/storm shutters or shades that are designed to protect the lanai area of a condominium unit may be used anytime throughout the year for hurricane, storm, rain and/or sun protection, for privacy, and for security. There is no time limit on the use of these lanai screens. This does NOT include windows inside of a lanai. All windows must follow the guidelines in #1 and #2.
- 4. All hurricane/storm shutters or shades that are installed outside of a screened in area or pool enclosure of a detached home and are bolted to the home must follow the rules as stated in Item 1.
 - Any privacy screens that have been attached to lanai screens without the consent of Collier County or the TwinEagles Architectural Review Committee are a clear and present danger to the community during a hurricane. If the home is unoccupied, these screens must be removed during hurricane season. If the home is occupied, the screen must be removed when the National Hurricane Center issues a hurricane watch or warning. The screens cannot be reattached until the threat of the storm has officially passed.
- 5. The color of all hurricane/storm shutters or shades must be complementary to the exterior of the home. Bare metal hurricane/storm shutters are not allowed.
- 6. Any new installation of hurricane/storm shutters or shades is subject to the approval of the Architectural Review Committee.
